 - Improve and develop

Learning to think and read in dialogue

- Learning is interactive and contextual:
 - Habits of mind becomes intellectual/dialogical virtues and later intellectual and moral character/practical wisdom
- Intellectual virtues: critical inquiry and refutation
- Dialogical virtues: cooperating to do this




Positive effects on
